The Chase Foundation is dedicated to making Child Life Services available at no cost to all children and their families served by Children's Hospital LA (CHLA). Established in 1970, the Chase Life Program was renamed in 2000 in honor of Chase Richards, who shortly after his second birthday, lost his battle to cancer. His last few weeks were spent at CHLA where he was given the chance to be a child. In between procedures Chase and his siblings retreated to the playrooms, where they were able to laugh, play, and draw with the other children. After Chase passed, the Richards learned that only a fraction- about 10% of the hundreds of children at the hospital each day- had access to the program due to limited funding. They were determined to generate a significant financial support for the program and create improved play spaces for the children on every patient floor. In June 2005 Universal donated the funding for the first "Teen Room" in the country at a Children's Hospital. Here the older kids can watch a movie, email their friends, and play video games on a specifically designed cart they can pull up in a wheelchair. The Chase Child Life Program is the largest of its kind.
